

## Program Highlights

We are proud to carry on the many programs and initiatives started by our founder Katherine McParland. In 2021 our work was focused on the following areas:

### Safe Suites Housing

The Safe Suites program has been funded by *BC Housing* for 3 years, and supports 6 youth at a time to live with 24/7 staff support while working to transition to more independent forms of housing. The Safe Suites program will move to the newly constructed Katherine's Place in the summer of 2023 with the continued support of *BC Housing*.

### Scattered Sites Housing

This housing program works with landlords in the community to provide apartments supported by AWHK Case Managers. The youth in these units receive support with life skills training and connections to community while they work towards taking over their lease from AWHK.

### Market Housing

AWHK administers rental subsidies provided by *BC Housing* that help youth afford rent at various locations across Kamloops. While we don't provide regular supports to these youth they often drop by so we can connect them with whatever they need.

### Peer Navigation & Peer Mentoring

The AWHK Peer Navigator works with many partners across Kamloops to connect youth with various supports, particularly related to employment and education. Peer Navigators help youth who are in our housing, or on our waitlist and youth who drop in.

### Advocacy & Awareness

AWHK is proud to be the backbone organization for the *BC Coalition to End Youth Homelessness* (BCCEYH) where we work with other youth serving groups to push for long lasting change. The group is creating a province-wide plan to end youth homelessness while also advocating for changes to legislation through "Katherine's Law" which will make it impossible for any youth to age out of care into homelessness.






## Financials

Financial sustainability is an important goal and a necessary step to ensure that we can serve youth well in an ongoing way. AWHK has been working with L. Pavanel Accounting Services for the last two years to develop financial systems that will serve the society well into the future. Thanks to the administrative support and to the many generous donors and funders who have come to support our work, we are pleased to have grown our annual budget from just under \$900,000 in 2020 to just over \$1.2M in 2021.

The largest portion of our work is done at Safe Suites, followed closely by our Scattered Sites Housing. All of the funds earned at Camp-Out this year have been set aside to provide program development at Katherine's Place. The rest of the AWHK budget is dedicated to our Peer Navigation and Peer Mentoring programs and administration.
